

Kerning with Macros

Macros are great for providing quick access to obscure features that you may want to use more often. For example, suppose you need to kern<sup>1</sup> a headline or move two letters closer together or further apart to make the headline look nicer. To do this manually, quite a few steps are required. This isn't a big deal if you need to adjust a headline only once. However, if you need to keep adjusting the same headline several times or kern lots of headlines, you'll quickly get tired of repeating the same steps.

Here's what you can do: create two macros, one that moves two letters slightly closer and one that moves two letters slightly further apart (see Figure 1). Here's how:

The included KERNL.WPM and KERNR.WPM (L for left and R for right) macros do just that.

To play each macro, place the cursor on the right-most letter (or between the letters if you're in Graphics Mode in WP 6.x), then press (Alt+F10), type "kernl" or "kernr" and press (Enter).

<sup>1</sup> What does kern mean? It means to make adjustments to the space between characters of a word.
