

The Rise and Fall of Text

Occasionally, I need to make text or WordPerfect characters rise above or drop below the baseline of the text without using the reduced size of Superscript or Subscript. The included JUMP.WPM macro will do this for you.

To run the macro, press Macro (Alt-F10), type "jump" and press (Enter). First, you'll be prompted to move the cursor to the first word to be raised or lowered. Do this and press (Enter). Next, you'll be prompted to block the text to be raised or lowered. If you want, this can be from one character to multiple pages of text. Once the text is blocked, press (Enter) and at the last prompt choose R to raise the text or L to lower the text. The macro will then either raise or lower the blocked text and quit. (See sample figure below.)

Notes:

- *If you're on the top line of a page, you can't raise the text, since it cannot be advanced up into the top margin. (However, you can drop text on the last line.)*
- *Be careful with this macro; it can yield unexpected results. For that reason, be sure to save your document before running it.*
- *The macro doesn't take into account the spacing of lines of text above or below the raised or lowered text. For that reason, press (Shift-F7), 6, to view the look of your document. If necessary, change your line spacing.*
