

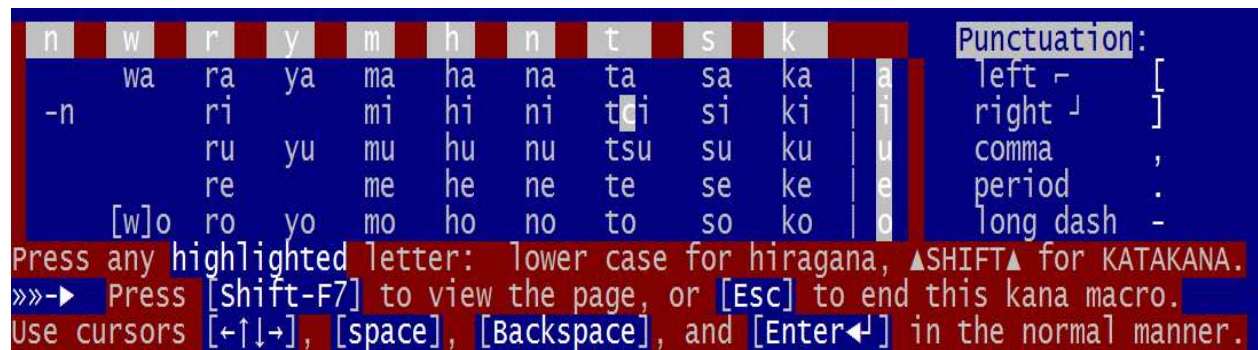
Use an On-Screen Japanese Keyboard
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The included JPN.WPM macro has no documentation other than in the macro itself, which states:

This macro program is subject to copyright, and is not on the public domain. However, the author grants a royalty-free license to use, to copy, and to adapt the program, subject to only three conditions:

- (1) Neither this message nor the copyright legend at the end may be removed.
- (2) If you figure a way to improve the macro, you promise to let me know.
- (3) If the program is to be used for COMMERCIAL purposes (ANY use for which compensation will be received), the user must send a notice in writing to Thomas Guilbert, 2370 S.W. Montgomery Drive, Portland, OR 97201, which simply states the name of the business and the way the macro will be used. (No license fee will be charged, now or in the future).

However, all the instructions are contained in the keyboard itself once you play the macro, which initially displays this on the main document screen:



If you press a consonant key (e.g., "h"), you will be shown additional choices that allow you specify which Japanese character to add. If you press a vowel key (e.g., "a"), the appropriate character will be inserted without additional choices. Note also that you have a choice of inserting either hiragana or katakana characters.

You may wish to change the name of the macro from JPN.WPM to ALTJ.WPM (or some other Alt-key combination) to make it easier to retrieve the keyboard.
